native insect feeders and our plants will benefit as the bats will eat the pests that like to feed on them.

### **CCA's New Project: Mudurup Rocks is getting a face lift**



Work has started on the untidy and weed infested area around the very special Mudurup Rocks site in the heart of the Cottesloe foreshore. It is an 18 month project, guided by Town of Cottesloe's Natural Area Management Plan and funded by Synergy and Landcare Australia, in partnership with CCA. Weeding has been underway for some months. ### **Coastal Conference: *Whose Coast Is It? Adapting for the Future***

Three CCA members attended the Conference and learned about big picture strategic issues which put our work into a larger perspective, and great local initiatives by groups such as ours which were encouraging and strengthened our enthusiasm for our work. In particular, Professor Kingsley Dixon's emphasis on the importance of coastal revegetation in WA's biodiversity hotspot to ensure the restoration, maintenance and survival of ecological connections underscored and justified the reasons for what we are doing – and he especially confirmed our belief that weed eradication is absolutely necessary: **without Coastcarers' intervention the weeds will displace indigenous species.**
