Suggested plants for your verge in Cottesloe

We recommend using 'Local' Plants

There are about 1800 local plant species around Perth which have adapted to the many different soil types and local environments. Our local plants are those which have adapted to local conditions, so they cope best with our local setting. Residents in the Town of Cottesloe are now encouraged to consider a 'local plants verge garden' in place of water and fertilizer hungry lawn.

Why Grow Local Plants?

Local plants provide food and shelter for our local birds, insects and lizards. They require much less water than most exotic species and they do not need any fertiliser. (If you must use fertilise, only use a minimal amount of a slow release type and apply only in the spring!). Overuse of fertilisers is the cause of many problems in our wetlands, rivers, lakes and oceans because of the run-off from our gardens into the stormwater drains flowing into our waterways. High nutrient levels lead to algal blooms which can be extremely harmful to fish and even humans.

What species could you plant on a verge in Cottesloe?

Some commercially available plants are listed below (common name in brackets)

Acacia lasiocarpa (dune moses) 1m

Conostylis candicans (grey cottonheads) .4m

Dianella revoluta (flax lily) .5m

Eremophila glabra (tar bush).5m

Frankenia paucifolia (seaheath) .5m

Grevillea crithmifolia – prostrate form, 1 m spreading shrub

Grevillea preissii (spider-net grevillia) 1m

Hemiandra pungens (snakebush) spreading low shrub

Isolepis nodosa (knotted club-rush) 1 m

Lepidosperma gladiatum (coast sword sedge) 1m

Leucophyta brownii (cushion bush).5m

Olearia axillaris (coastal daisybush) 1 m

Pimelea ferruginea (coast banjne) .5m

Rhagodia baccata (berry saltbush) 1m

Trachymene coerulea (Rottnest Island daisy) – annual herb

Westringia dampieri – 1m

CREEPERS

Carpobrotus virescens (pigface)

Hardenbergia comptoniana (native wisteria)

Kennedia prostrata (running postman)

The plants listed below are too tall for your verge but you might like to consider them for your bird-attracting and water-wise garden.

Allocasuarina fraseriana (common sheoak) 10m

Alyxia buxifolia (sea box) 2m

Calothamnus quadrifidus (one-sided bottlebrush) – 3 m tall

Callitris preissii (Rottnest cypress) – 5-10 m tall

Diplolaena dampieri (Dampier's rose) 2m

Lepidosperma gladiatum (coast sword sedge) 1m

Macrozamia riedlei (zamia) 2m

Melaleuca systena 1.5 m

Melaleuca huegelii (chenille honeymyrtle) 3m

Myoporum insulare (boobiala) 2.5m

Pittosporum phylliraeoides (cheesewood)- coastal form, 4 – 5m

Spyridium globulosum (basket bush) 3 m

Templetonia retusa (cockies' tongues) 3 m

Zanthorrhoea preissii (grass tree) 3m
