



- collaborative, considered and flexible




New issues emerge from time to time and are discussed and consensus is generally achieved.

#### **Current Status**


- Small stable volunteer group of mostly long-standing members (about half actively involved, others in more passive support)
- Strong and highly active committee strong sharing of organisation and operational functions – drawing on individual skills and interests
- Group 'size' augmented by involving partner groups (corporate, educational, social...)
- Functional close partnership with the Town of Cottesloe
- New 3-way relationship between CCA, Town of Cottesloe and Perth NRM (includes new initiatives with local schools)
- CCA typically annual on ground activity centered on an externally funded project - including funding for use of contractors in targeted roles – recently planting 4-5000 plants/year – this year 5100

#### **Key on-ground activities**

Grant St dunes – major planting from north of the Surf Club to Grant St beach access path – 2,500 seedlings planted (current funded project)

Salvado St to Pearse St dunes – infill planting – 1,500 seedlings

Vlamingh to Sydney St – infill planting – 500 seedling

Grant Marine Park – infill planting – 200 plants

Cottesloe Native Garden – infill – 100 plants

Railway reserve South Cottesloe – planting – 400 plants

We use plant numbers as a metric of our activity — in fact planting is the easy bit — success is largely determined by the time and effort taken in preparation and subsequent management.

### Coastal revegetation is a complex multi-faceted operation 12 Key steps that require detailed and active management

- Site selection flows from strategic plan
- Determine plant species landscape position and soil type
- Source locally adapted plants seeds/cuttings 12 months in advance
- Pre-planting weed control (remove perennial weeds and undertake seed set control of annuals (can be in spring/summer/autumn prior to planting depending on the target species).
- Create planting niches (dig, fertilise and water holes more details to follow)
- Plant tube stock into prepared holes
- Mulch around plants if feasible
- Post plant weeding manually and/or herbicide
- Watering in first summer (typically 3-4 times depending on rainfall starting in early summer)
- Maintain weed control in year 2 (site specific)
- Infill plant to compensate for losses (typically 20% but seasonal)
- Continue weed monitoring/control for 2-3 years










#### Future holds challenges

- Our 'mature' group needs fresh ideas and new boundaries to retain the involvement/engagement of members
- Recruiting new members particularly younger members is a requirement for continuity
